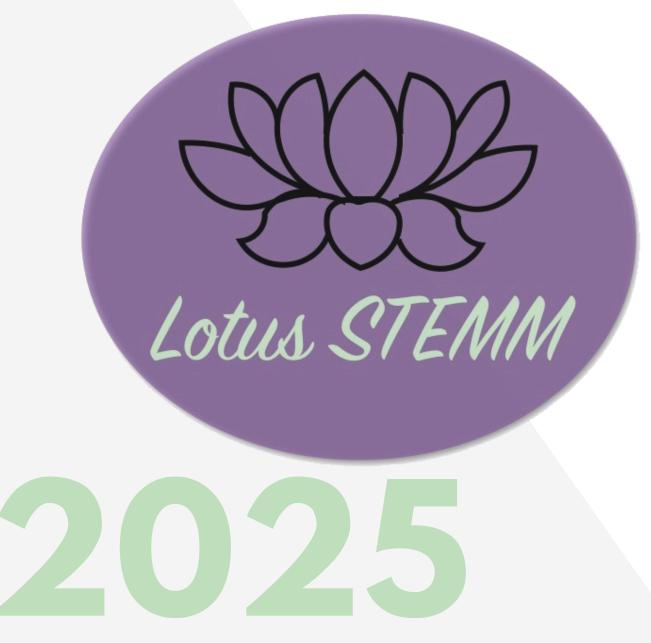

## Land Acknowledgement

Lotus STEMM's hub of operation is located in Peel Region in Canada.

We would like to begin by acknowledging the land on Turtle Island where Lotus STEMM operates, which includes the Treaty Lands and Territory of the Mississaugas of the Credit, the territory of the Anishinabek, Huron-Wendat, Haudenosaunee, and Ojibway/Chippewa peoples; the land that is home to the Métis; and most recently, the territory of the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation who are direct descendants of the Mississaugas of the Credit.

Lotus STEMM also has presence across Turtle Island on the traditional unceded territory of the Musqueam, Squamish, and Tsleil-Waututh Coast Salish Nations, and the Blackfoot Confederacy (Siksika, Kainai, Piikani), Stoney Nakoda, and Tsuut'ina Nation, whose ancestral lands we touch upon.

Lotus STEMM acknowledges the land as an act of reconciliation and gratitude to those whose territory we reside on and enjoy.

Lotus STEMM is humbled and honoured to have a global reach, noting the Pan-Indigenous communities around the world where our international team works and lives.

Lotus STEMM respects diversity of beliefs and integrates cultural wisdom, traditions, and knowledge in the work that we do. We are grateful to have the opportunity to work on this land and by doing so, give our respect to its first inhabitants, working together towards an equitable society.

In Ruth Koleszar-Green's paper, "What is a Guest? What is a Settler?", published in the Fall 2018 edition of Cultural and Pedagogical Inquiry, she

notes an important distinction that I wish to highlight here, as part of our Land Acknowledgement:

Settlers do the bare minimum when it comes to acknowledging the land (if they do anything at all) and try to absolve themselves of any further actions or responsibilities.

Guests, on the other hand, acknowledge the many responsibilities and expectations that are required of them. A major aspect of this is showing up in solidarity with Indigenous peoples when it comes to expectations of decolonization of the land, including: stewardship of the land, and protecting precious resources: water, animals, plants, and all of their ecosystems, to ensure that there is abundance for all life that is yet to come. We cannot, she states, "decolonize the mind" without actively supporting decolonization of the land. Otherwise, we are continuing the capitalistic land grabs, resource extraction, and irreversible perpetuating damage the environment.

As a Guest, myself, I call on all of us to be good Guests, and actively disrupt colonial practices and exploitation of the environment.

## **CEO's statement**

Working on Lotus STEMM for 7 years, but really longer since before it was registered, has been one of the most challenging and rewarding tasks I have ever taken on in life. I look at this past year with mixed emotions: we've had a number of highs riddled with challenges, but what is growth without challenges?

Being awarded funding from Women and Gender Equality (WAGE) Canada for a project that I had thought about at the inception of Lotus STEMM has been one of the highs I speak of. It provided validation for the project and the need to push for systemic change around women and girls, rather than focusing on changing the women. A girl or woman needs more than words, she needs others who surround her and influence her decisions to understand the levels of barriers she is facing or will face, and figure out how to support her. With this 3 year long project, we are in a position of not only implementing GBA+ methodology, but to work with the South Asian women in STEMM that we are developed to support. With the involvement of these women, Lotus STEMM has identified a number of barriers that we can use to create workshops for key stakeholders in their lives: parents, educators, employers and community leaders.

In the last 12 months, we've developed a team, all of who have lived experiences as South Asian women in STEMM, that is trustworthy and dedicated. A team that has become my ongoing support, while easing up my "job" as the CEO. I KNOW that they will truly represent and embody what the project needs with empathy, understanding, and a keen drive to influence the current environment. To support this work, we were proud to bring on board Canada Summer Jobs students and a dedicated team of volunteers, all of whom contributed significantly to the success of the WAGE grant activities. Their energy and commitment helped bring fresh perspectives and momentum to our research and outreach.

We're also excited to share that we're currently in collaborative conversations with several organizations to co-develop workshops, events, and activities aligned with the goals of the WAGE grant. These partnerships promise to extend the reach and depth of the *Breaking Barriers* project, creating more inclusive and impactful spaces across communities.

This year also marked an exciting expansion of our leadership team. We warmly welcomed new board members who bring with them fresh perspectives, diverse expertise, and a shared passion for our mission. I wish them all the very best as they step into their roles. Their presence signals a new chapter—one that promises stability, strengthened governance, and a deeper strategic focus.

We have also been active in our pursuit of additional support, having applied to several new grants to sustain and scale our programs nationally. Our ambition is clear: to grow beyond Ontario and deliver meaningful, measurable change across Canada.

As I reflect on all that we've accomplished together, I also share this with a sense of personal transition. This marks the **conclusion of my four-year term on the Board of Directors**, a role that has deeply shaped me both personally and professionally. While I will no longer serve on the board, my

commitment to Lotus STEMM is unwavering. I look forward to continuing as an active member of this incredible community, supporting the organization in identifying allies, exploring new avenues for impact, and holding space for accountability to the transformative work being done.

### Treasurer's statement

Good day to all our mentees, mentors, volunteers, collaborators, sponsors, board members, and stakeholders. My name is Pooja Shree, and it has been my privilege to serve as Treasurer and board member for Lotus STEMM for the year 2023 and 2024.

I am pleased to present the report on the organization's financial standing since our last Annual General Meeting in September 2024. The last fiscal year was marked by significant growth in both revenues and expenditures as Lotus STEMM expanded its programs and staffing capacity. This report provides a comparison to the prior fiscal year (2023–2024) and outlines key highlights in revenue, expenses, and staffing

#### Revenue

This year, LS generated \$34,161 in total revenue from non-government sources, 68% up from \$20,307.86 in FY2024. This included ScienceUpFirst (SUF) science translations and agreements as well as SUF community grant.

Grants from the initiative SUF, and sponsorship for the annual Degrees of Success conference and Canadian Association of Science Centres. LS also received government grants worth \$117,855, primarily from the Women and Gender Equity (WAGE) program.

The total revenue including all the revenue sources amounted to \$152,095.62.

#### **Expenses**

The increased funds this year have enabled us to cover our ongoing operational expenses, which include:

- Labor and payroll for our old and new employees
- Dues and subscriptions
- Legal and professional fees
- Office expenses

In addition, these financial resources have allowed us to invest in new initiatives, including:

- Subcontractor support
- Speaker honorariums
- Other operational costs essential for growth and sustainability

The total expenditure this year was \$165,201.02 (vs. \$53,917.01 in FY2024), reflecting program expansion and new staffing. Primarily, expenses in payroll & wages were the largest, amounting to \$103,673.56, as LS supported 10 employees under various funding streams. These included 4 under Canada Summer Jobs, 3 under WAGE Project, 2 under the SUF funding, and 1 permanent staff (Treasurer/Executive function). Other expenses included legal & professional fees related to project and compliance, supplies, travel, honorariums.

This staffing allowed Lotus STEMM to strengthen programming, outreach, and organizational infrastructure.

### Treasurer's statement

#### Conclusion

FY2025 was a year of significant expansion, with increased grant funding enabling the hiring of additional staff and scaling of programs. While expenditures grew sharply—particularly in payroll and professional fees—the organization maintained stability and positioned itself for future growth. Continued focus on diversifying revenue streams, managing expenses, and building reserves will be important priorities going into FY2026.

#### **Strategic Priorities Moving Forward**

As Lotus STEMM continues its growth journey, our priority is to maintain stability while building on the momentum achieved this year. We will continue to strengthen our organizational foundation, refining our strategies, and restructuring our Board and staffing to better align with our mission. We have also placed a strong emphasis on securing grants and funding opportunities as well as to hire trained staff. All this will help us to create a more sustainable workforce and reinforce our operational capacity—positioning the organization for long-term impact.

#### **Closing Remarks**

Lotus STEMM remains, at its heart, a volunteer-driven organization. We take great pride in the dedication, service, and connections built through the efforts of our volunteers. Over the past year, I have seen many of us navigate personal and professional challenges, as well as moments of grief—yet we came together to create meaningful work and lasting memories. Shout out to Roopali, Vidya, Bhavana, Arshdeep, and others that I had the privilege to know, work with and learn from. You are all powerhouses!

As I conclude my term, I carry with me deep inspiration from the commitment, resilience, and passion I have witnessed among my colleagues. I am confident that my successor will carry this momentum forward with equal dedication, continuing to make Canada a better place for South Asian women, one step at a time.

Thank you all for the invaluable work you do and the impact you create every day!

#### **Paksh - Mental Health Support Group**



April - July, 2025



Virtual - Global

PAKSH, an initiative under Lotus STEMM, was created as a peer support network focused on the **mental well-being of international academics** (graduate students and postdoctoral researchers). The aim of the program is to provide a safe, confidential, and non-judgmental space where participants can openly discuss the unique mental health challenges faced in academia.

Over the course of the most recent 4-month cycle, six deeply relevant and thought-provoking sessions were conducted:

- Everyone Has Mental Health: Focused on normalizing conversations around mental health and breaking the stigma, especially in academic spaces.
- **Being Marginalized in Academia:** A critical dialogue on the experiences of underrepresented minorities and the compounding challenges of systemic exclusion.
- Quantity Over Quality?: Explored the toxic culture of long hours and hyper-productivity in academia, questioning sustainability and personal cost.
- **Anxiety in Academia:** Participants shared personal coping strategies and learned ways to manage stress and performance pressure.
- Toxic Lab Environments: Addressed the realities of harmful power dynamics and created a space to collectively explore actionable solutions.
- Burnout and ways to cope: Our guest speaker, Dr. Suramya Agrawal, conducted an interactive session about how our conditioning impacts our performance at work, pushing us to burnout. She gave us practical insights into handling anxiety and spoke about the importance of being exploratory vs. being result-oriented, as a way to approach work.

### Paksh - Mental Health Support Group



April - July, 2025



Virtual - Global

Each PAKSH session fostered a safe, confidential space where participants shared personal experiences, reflected on struggles, and supported one another through peer validation and empowerment. While not therapy, the program provided much-needed emotional support rooted in trust and solidarity. Its strengths include strict confidentiality through a registration process, inclusive participation from diverse international backgrounds, and a community-centered approach that promotes empathy and connection.

In a field where isolation is common especially for international and marginalized scholars; PAKSH fills a vital gap, aligning with Lotus STEMM's mission to support underrepresented voices in STEMM. Positive participant feedback underscores the need for continued support and potential expansion. PAKSH is more than a mental health initiative; it is a step toward cultural change in academia.

Funding from the Canadian Association of Science Centres (CASC) was highly useful and impactful for Lotus STEMM to be able to work in the community, partnering with Punjabi Community Health Services (PCHS) Seniors program and international students. With the microgrant, LS developed and conducted 2 successful events focusing on finding culturally relevant cardiovascular health information, and combating misinformation and loneliness. Presented in Hindi/Punjabi/Urdu for audience, we also developed evaluation and feedback translated appropriately, and developed methodology to provide the options for audio evolution collection. Furthermore, we were able to support a small business. with the purchase of food for wrap-around support for the participants.





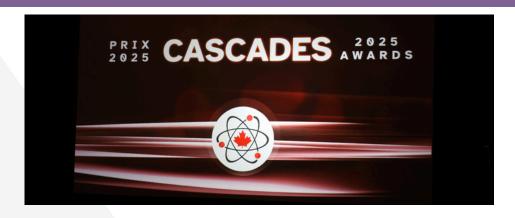




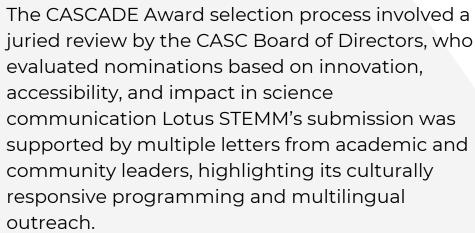

Lotus STEMM received a 2025 CASCADE Award from the Canadian Association of Science Centres (CASC) at its annual conference on June 12 in St. John's, Newfoundland. The organization won in Category 3, which recognizes projects with budgets ranging from \$50,000 to \$250,000, for its outstanding contribution to multilingual and multicultural science communication.



During the award ceremony, CASC CEO Dr.

Marianne Mader remarked, "Lotus STEMM
exemplifies what inclusive science

and creating space for voices that have long
been underrepresented." Following the win,
Lotus STEMM was featured in the CASC June 2025
newsletter, which praised the organization's

## Dr. Chaudhary Awarded King Charles III's Coronation Medal

Dr. Roopali Chaudhary, Founder and CEO of Lotus STEMM, was awarded the King Charles III Coronation Medal by the Royal Canadian Institute for Science (RCIScience). This national honour recognizes Canadians who have made significant contributions to science communication, public engagement, and inclusive STEMM outreach.

The selection process was juried and merit-based, with RCIScience reviewing nominations that demonstrated sustained impact and innovation in science engagement. Recipients were chosen for fostering inclusive communities and combating misinformation in STEMM, aligning with the medal's broader mission to celebrate those building a more equitable Canada.

A 3-year research initiative funded by Women and Gender Equality Canada (WAGE) Systemic Change Project fund, and in partnership with Campfire Kinship Storytelling Inc., investigates the systemic, cultural, and institutional barriers faced by South Asian women in STEMM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics, and Medicine). 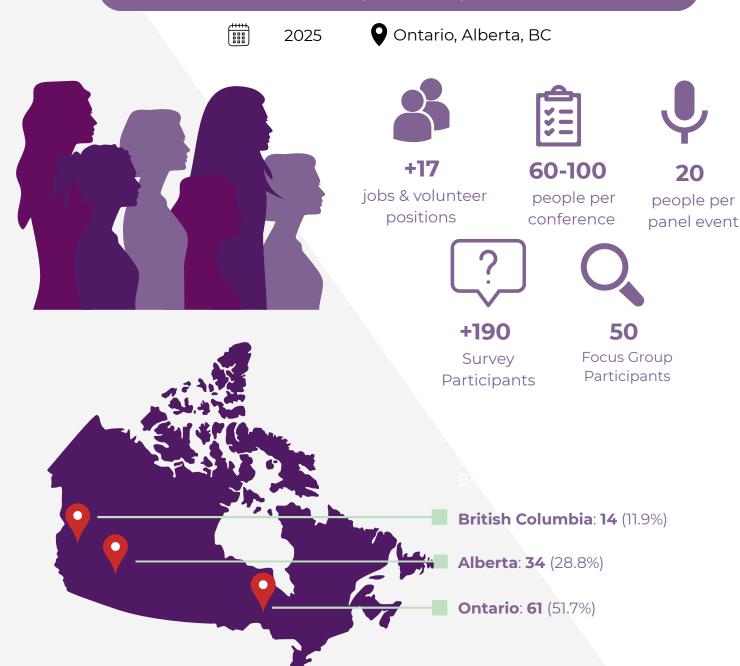

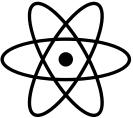
Distribution of South Asian Heritage of all Breaking Barriers project participants.

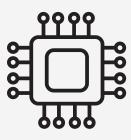

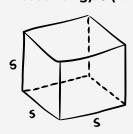

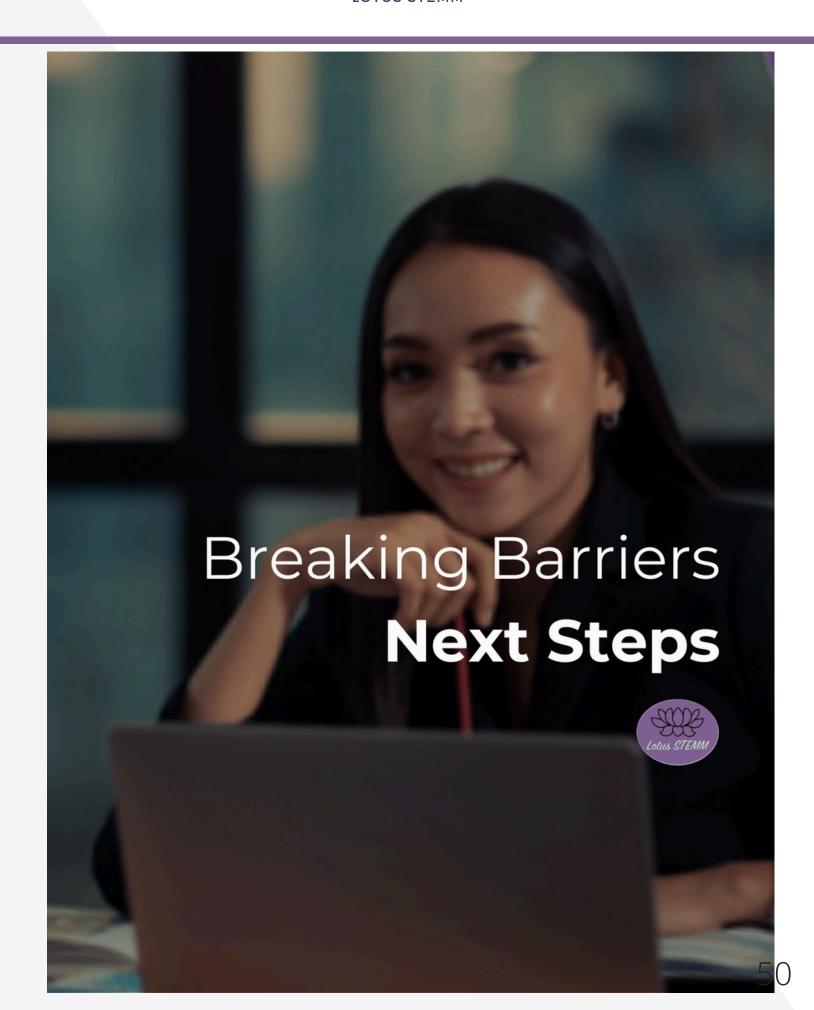

## **Next Steps**

#### What's next?

Looking ahead, we will start to transition from research to developing a **curriculum** and **free resources** to equip parents, educators, employers and community leaders to apply this skill in real-world scenarios. We will also be launching <u>9 customized workshops</u>, **co-designed** with input from our survey and focus group **participants**.

#### **Workshop Focus**

Each workshop will **address** a different **key barrier** identified in our research, such as:

- Navigating cultural stigma in STEMM
- Addressing institutional discrimination
- Building leadership skills
- Enhancing mental health supports in academia
- Creating pathways to entrepreneurship

#### **Target Audiences**

- Parents of South Asian girls, women, and gender-diverse individuals in high school, post-secondary education, and early-career stages.
- Educators, employers, and community leaders committed to equity in STEMM.
